Capital Improvement Program: Mayor's Message

Goals of the Capital Improvement Program (CIP)

are being addressed in a responsible manner based on priority and thoughtful planning. A capital improvement program is a critical component of the capital improvement budget and the overall budget strategy. By formalizing a capital plan and capital budget, the The City of Everett relies on a five (5) year capital improvement program and a one (1) year capital budget to ensure that capital needs City of Everett now has the ability and knowledge to address deferred maintenance issues that have been postponed and ignored in prior years, as well as plan for the future needs of the City. When considering funding items in the Capital improvement Program, the City strategically pursues available options from grants at the state and federal levels, and also utilizes other financing sources to avoid the issuance of long-term debt for certain projects that can be covered in full by such retained earnings. From a financing perspective, priority is given to projects with grant revenues or other matching funds to offset the costs of borrowing.

consumption, decreasing deferred maintenance costs, reducing heating and electricity expenses, and creating efficiencies by means Addressing capital needs when appropriate will assist the City in reaching many of its longer-term goals such as reducing fuel of technological advances and automation. A sound capital improvement program will continue to ensure that our facilities, equipment and vehicles are safe, energy efficient and operable at all times to deliver top-notch services to the City's residents.

Goals of the Mayor – FY2023 Capital Improvement Program (CIP)

My main goals are to improve the overall planning and budget process for addressing capital needs and to ensure accountability as it relates to implementation of capital work projects. The FY2023 capital budget is focused on overhauling and renovating neglected parks, playgrounds and recreational spaces, as well as continuing to improve the City's infrastructure.

In holding to the policies set forth in the CIP, we have given priority to projects that can use grant funds to help offset overall costs of projects, or in some cases, fund an entire project. Otherwise, projects are ranked based upon priority as well as the ability to reduce ong term operational costs

FY2023 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) – Highlights of Proposed CIP and FY2023 Capital Budget

For FY2023, my administration has created a capital plan that is fiscally responsible and transparent. The plan includes a particular focus on asset preservation, replacement of apparatus, and continued improvements to the City's Infrastructure.

Proposed capital equipment purchases for FY2023 include the following:

- New vehicles and equipment for the Police Department
- New vehicle and equipment for the Fire Department
- Replacement of City Services Vehicles
- Replacement of Inspectional Services Vehicles
- Replacement of City Information Technology systems

The total amount of the proposed FY2022 Capital Budget that will require an appropriation from the General fund operating budget is \$175,000.

Proposed capital projects include, but are not limited to the following:

- Design and Construction of a new police station
- Design and refurbishment of cltywide tot Lots and parks
 - Connolly Center renovations, including new roof
- City hall improvements, including a new roof
- Replacement of the elevators at the High School
- Street and sidewalk repairs
- Continuation of the Complete Streets program
- Improvements to Commercial Triangle
- Ferry and Elm Street improvements (City portion)
- Hancock street design

- Waterfront Improvements
- •

Also, with regards to the City's infrastructure, the City is estimating \$650,000 from the State's Chapter 90 program for eligible road and sidewalk repairs in addition to the approved bonding.

Further details for all capital improvement items in the FY2023 Capital Improvement Budget will be included in your binders.

I hereby submit the City of Everett Hazardous Mitigation Plan 2021 Update to the Council for adoption as outlined in the attached letter.

Under the requirements of the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 ("the Act"), hazard mitigation plans must be updated and re-submitted to FEMA every five years for a locality or state to maintain funding eligibility. 

I believe you are aware of the City Council item referred to both of you as well as the administration last night, requesting that Route 16 be transferred from MassDOT to City ownership. I wanted to make you aware that, we have been working with MassDOT for the past 10 months or so to develop a major reconstruction project for the roadway. I've attached the Project Initiation Form issued by MassDOT showing that the project is currently approved for \$15M, though I would not be surprised to see this revised upwards significantly. Last summer, the project was kicked off by performing a Roadway Safety Audit, and last fall, MassDOT hired McMahon Engineering to begin design work. I've been involved in the process to-date and speak with the project team on a regular basis.





Who is a Covered Individual Under the Law?

Generally, a worker qualifies as a covered individual eligible for paid family and medical leave benefits if:

- S/he is covered by unemployment insurance in Massachusetts and paid wages by a Massachusetts employer; or
- S/he is a self-employed individual who resides and works in Massachusetts and chooses to opt-in to the program; and
 - S/he earned more than 30 times the expected benefit and more than \$5,400 (adjusted annually) in the last four completed quarters preceding the application for benefits.

Job Protection

Generally, an employee who has taken paid family or medical leave must be restored to the employee's previous position or to an equal position, with the same status, pay, employment benefits, length-of-service credit, and seniority as of the date of leave.

These job protections do not apply to former employees, independent contractors or self-employed individuals.

No Retaliation or Discrimination

- It is unlawful for an employer to discriminate or retaliate against an employee for exercising any right to which s/he is entitled under the law.
- more than three years after the violation occurs, institute a civil action in the superior court, and may be entitled to An employee or former employee who is discriminated or retaliated against for exercising rights under the law may, not damages of as much as three times his or her lost wages.

Health Insurance

Employers must continue to provide for and contribute to employees¹ employment-related health insurance benefits, if any, at the level and under the conditions coverage would have been provided if the employees had continued working for the duration of such leave.

WORKER ELIGIBILITY

- up to 12 weeks of paid family leave in a benefit year related to the birth, adoption, or foster care placement of a child, to care for a family member with a serious health condition, or because of a qualifying exigency arising out of the fact that a family member is on active duty or has been notified of an impending call to active duty in the Armed Forces.
- up to 26 weeks of paid family leave in a benefit year to care for a family member who is a covered service member with a serious health condition.





I am submitting an elevation package with architectural renderings regarding my client's application for Approval of Mixed Retail and Residential Use for the above referenced parcel pursuant to the City of Everett Zoning Ordinance, Appendix A, Section 6(A)(8) (Special Exception).

1. PROPOSED PROJECT:

The applicant seeks to raze the existing building, which is presently a mixed-use building containing a restaurant on the ground-level (Ferry Street Grill) and a residential unit on the second floor with twelve surface parking spaces. The Applicant proposes to construct a 4-story mixed-use building with a new 840 square foot restaurant on the ground level and sixteen (16) residential apartments on the upper floors and a penthouse unit with a small common function room on the roof area. There will be 6 one-bedroom units and 10 two-bedroom units The project features thirty-eight (38) parking spaces, featuring both surface level parking (13 spaces) and sub-surface grade parking (25 spaces). The parking is compliant with the requirements of the Everett Zoning Ordinance. Three (3) of the proposed residential units will be categorized as affordable under the Everett Zoning Ordinance, Appendix A, Section 32 (Inclusionary Zoning).
