Honorable Members of the City Council,

In accordance with the updated city of Everett Reprecincting map, the Election Commission submits for your approval the proposed Polling Locations which will go into effect for the upcoming state 2022 election cycle.

The addition of a third precinct in each ward, along with two sub precincts (1/3A and 2/2A), created a need for six additional polling locations. The changes also resulted in roughly half of the street addresses within city limits being transferred to a new ward and/or precinct. The Election Commission has done our best to assign these polling locations with the least amount of disruption to registered voters as possible.

One step we have taken in order to minimize the amount of voters who will see a change in their polling location was to house two polling places within every space where it was possible. Assigning two precincts to one building created situations where many voters who may see their ward and/or precinct change will continue to vote in the same physical location they previously had. We also looked at the temporary 2020 Polling Locations put into effect due to the Covid pandemic and used them as a guide to create locations that voters were familiar with and had voted at in the recent past.

The two new additional buildings you will find are the Parlin School and the Whittier School — both of these schools were traditionally used in the past as polling locations and will be familiar to long time Everett voters. We have received approval to utilize these school buildings from both the Principal of each school and Superintendent Priya Tahiliani, who has been kept informed and up to date throughout the process. We have also toured the spaces in order to be sure they are accessible and functionable on Election Day.

Our goal is to utilize the first floor gymnasium in the Parlin School. The gymnasium allows us to take advantage of the 2 front gymnasium entrances which will be clearly marked for each precinct and will serve to streamline the process for both voters and poll workers. This layout also avoids having individuals travel anywhere within the school aside from the gymnasium creating the most secure environment, which is always a top priority, especially when dealing

with school buildings. In order to achieve this goal and pursuant to ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliance requirements we worked with AMRamp to design a ramp that would make the front gymnasium entrance handicap accessible. The ramp proposal has been both sent to and approved by the Principal of the Parlin School and Superintendent Tahiliani.

Our mission in proposing the polling locations for all eighteen precincts was to create the least amount of change for voters as possible within the perimeters of the new wards and precincts. As you can see on the 2022 Reprecincting map our options were limited but we are confident that our proposed submission is the most efficient and advantageous path for the voters of the city of Everett.

One of multiple teacher rooms was converted to a classroom. Part of the storage area was converted to additional classroom space. Part of the central storage area was converted to a marketing classroom. We plan to convert the rest of central storage (approximately 21' X 53') to additional classroom space this coming summer.

Everett High was built into a hill. The front of the building slopes toward Ferry Street to the south. The first floor is at ground level on the west side of the building and the ground slopes down so the basement on the east side of the building is at ground level. The front of the building has two levels of parking spaces for faculty and staff. Approximately, one hundred and sixty parking spaces are available on site. Glendale Park, the largest green space in the community with a walking path, baseball diamond and two little league fields borders the front of the school property.

On Gledhill Avenue at the rear of the building, the fourth floor on the west side of the building is at ground level and the second floor is at ground level on the east side. Sixty parking spaces line the rear of the building the length of Gledhill Avenue. The entire north side of Gledhill Avenue is occupied by housing owned and operated by the Everett Housing Authority. Adjacent to the school on the east side is a terraced plot of land that is part of the school property. Adjacent to the building on the east is Snake Hill, a serpentine street approximately 75 yards in length. East of Snake Hill is a landscaped hillside that is pie shaped and occupies an area of approximately 4000 square feet. Adjacent to the west side of the building is a steeply sloping strip of land that measures approximately 40 feet by 140 feet. Adjacent to that strip of land are the backyards of a row of houses that are located on the east side of Sycamore Street.

MECHANICAL and ELECTRICAL SYSTEMS: Please provide a detailed description of the current mechanical and electrical systems and any known problems or existing conditions (maximum of 5000 characters).

The building is served by four boilers which provide heat and hot water. The two hot water tanks were replaced in the summer of 2018. A chiller provides chilled water for air conditioning. Most classrooms are served by univents. Other spaces are served by a single univent, variable air vent (VAV) system. Specialty spaces such as the field house, auditorium, and cafeteria are served by individual air handling units to maintain conditions in those unique spaces. One set of cooling towers has been replaced (2019) at a cost of \$104,400. and the other set was replaced last year at a lost of \$107,541.

Electricity is brought into the building from overhead street service to a pad mounted transformer, which in turn feeds a 5000 amp switchboard. Large equipment is powered by 480 volt power. Distribution closets located throughout the building step-down the power for lights and receptacles in all spaces. The entire electrical system is copper wire.

An oil powered emergency generator provides electricity when needed.

There are no known problems with the electrical system.

The district contracts with ENE Systems to administer a planned maintenance program for all HVAC systems including boilers, rooftop units, chillers, air handlers, univents, pumps and temperature control systems. The chiller at EHS was also repaired during the summer at a cost of \$107,541. The chiller was repaired and we had to refill two cooling towers.

The building interior is of masonry, concrete block construction. Most surfaces are covered with drywall, skim coated and painted. The Main entryway at the front of the building has slate flooring. Corridor, cafeteria and classroom floors are cast-in place concrete covered with vinyl tile.

Lighting is predominantly LED fixtures with bulbs hung in a suspended ceiling. Ceiling materials are predominantly acoustical tiles.

PROGRAMS and OPERATIONS: Please provide a detailed description of the current grade structure and programs offered and indicate whether there are program components that cannot be offered due to facility constraints, operational constraints, etc. (maximum of 5000 characters).

Everett High School is an inclusive high school serving grades nine through twelve. Regular education students attend classes with special education students and students who are English Learners. Everett High School offers a complete academic program, consistent with curriculum offerings in typical high schools through an academy model. That program includes instruction in English Language Arts, Mathematics, History, the Physical Sciences, and World Languages. The English curriculum includes English I, II, III and IV as well as several journalism, debate and public speaking, Utopias and Dystopias, Literature and Philosophy, Sports Writing, Creative Writing, and prep courses. The Mathematics curriculum includes Algebra I and Algebra II as well as Geometry, Pre-Calculus, Calculus and Statistics. The science program includes classes in Anatomy and Physiology, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Earth Science, and Oceanography as well as Engineering and Robotics and other courses as well. The Social Studies curricula includes both U.S. and Modern US History as well US Government and Politics, World History, Psychology, Sociology, Black Studies and Introduction to Hip Hop. World Language offerings include French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese and Latin.

Of the 2,187 students enrolled at Everett High School, 1,421 students speak a language other than English in their home. Of those students, 549 students require English Learner and sheltered core content classes while they learn English. Sheltered instruction is founded on the concept of providing meaningful instruction in the content areas for transitioning Limited English Proficient (LEP) students while they reach English fluency. Instead of providing watered down curriculum for LEP students, sheltered instruction allows for the content to be equal to that of native English speakers while improving the students' grasp of the language. Teachers call on a number of different instruction methods such as the use of socialization practices to allow the content to be more accessible. The differences between ESL instruction, which is required at Everett High School, and use of sheltered instruction does not focus entirely on language development; instead, through various other topics in the curriculum, English Page 70/172

proficiency is achieved. Seventy-seven ELL and sheltered classes are offered this year.

Everett High school offers a full complement of curriculum offerings that are outside of the traditional core content areas. There are computer offerings which include Computer Applications and Digital Finance. There are offerings in the visual arts including Painting and Drawing, Sculpture, Graphic Design, Illustration and Digital Photography. The music program consists of traditional music classes but also Percussion, String, Brass, Woodwind classes, Piano Lab, Orchestra and Vocal classes. In the area of health and wellness, by regulation, all students must participate in at least one physical education class every year. In addition to Physical Education, students may select Weightlifting, Competitive Games and/or Aerobics classes.

The Allied Health Academy offers students who participate in this small learning community to experience in Health and Wellness, Health Care Skills I and II, Nutrition and Fitness, Health Issues, Parenting and Independent Living.

Students in their senior year, participate in a Healthcare Internship during which students work alongside health care professionals in all departments at the Cambridge Health Hospital, a Cambridge Health Alliance facility and in the areas of Career Technical Education. Classes are also offered in Building Technology (carpentry), Machine Tool Technology, Culinary Arts, Marketing, Hospitality, Medical Assistance, Health Assisting and Web-Design. A restaurant kitchen and dining area, separate from the main cafeteria, is specifically designed for the Culinary Arts Program. We would like to add Electrical, HVAC and Plumbing to our Career Technical Education (CTE) offerings but we just do not have the space at Everett High School to do that at this time. A new high school would afford the Everett Public Schools the opportunity to increase the number of CTE offerings to our students.

There are currently 487 students with special needs ages 14 through 22. The educational needs of these students range from attending general education classes with academic support, to students with profound disabilities, who require specialized instruction and a full time, individual paraprofessional. There are special education classes offered in all core content areas. The number of class sections is high due to class size and age range regulations. It is the requirements of a student's Individual Education Plan that dictates what classes are required to be offered

EDUCATIONAL SPACES: Please provide a detailed description of the Educational Spaces within the facility, a description of the number and sizes (in square feet) of classrooms, a description of science rooms/labs including ages and most recent updates, a description of the cafeteria, gym and/or auditorium and a description of the media center/library (maximum of 5000 characters).

There are one hundred and twenty-one classrooms at Everett High School. The average size is 900 square feet. Eighty four are general education classrooms, eleven are science labs, each with twenty-four lab stations. There are also four science classrooms with lab tables but not lab stations. These four classrooms are without water, electricity, and natural gas as found in the science labs. There is one world language laboratory, one chorus room, one band room and two arts rooms.

The cafeteria, located on the first floor, has a seating capacity of 590 students at round and rectangular tables with seating attached. Food preparation and serving areas are separate from the cafeteria proper.

The gymnasium, located on the fourth floor has sport flooring with a hardwood basketball court. Motorized seating extends and retracts from the east and west walls. A non-regulation track is also located in the gymnasium.

The auditorium includes a seating area as well as a stage with an orchestra pit. The main seating area of the auditorium is located on the second floor and rises at the rear to the third floor level. Balcony seating rises from the third floor to the fourth floor at the rear. Seating is approximately 1,100.

The library/media center is located on the fifth floor. In addition to the stacks for hardcover materials and an area for periodicals, there are also computer workstations for instruction and or student use and several other workstations for student use.

CAPACITY and UTILIZATION: Please provide the original design capacity and a detailed description of the current capacity and utilization of the school facility. If the school is overcrowded, please describe steps taken by the administration to address capacity issues. Please also describe in detail any spaces that have been converted from their intended use to be used as classroom space (maximum of 5000 characters).

The new Everett High School, completed and occupied in August of 2007, was constructed to accommodate 1,800 students. It currently serves a student population of 2,187 students and growing. In the 2023-2024 school year, it is estimated to have a student enrollment of 2,334. The facility is fully utilized to the point where at some times during the school day there are no open classrooms.

The administration has undertaken several measures to combat the overcrowded conditions. Science classes shift around so that science classes scheduled into classrooms without science labs can be held in classrooms with lab setups when those classes are not running labs. In Music, a number of classes are held on the auditorium stage because no music classrooms (which are soundproofed) are available. The gymnasium, weightlifting room and aerobics rooms have been fully utilized. In an effort to decrease class sizes in other curriculum areas, more physical education teachers have been hired in an effort to increase the number of students who are served in large spaces like the gymnasium, aerobics room, the weight room, and weather permitting Glendale Park. The aerobics room has been outfitted with treadmills, elliptical machines, rowing machines and other exercise equipment for class use. Eighty-eight classes are scheduled with seven teachers in those rooms. Physical education class size averages thirty-five students, aerobics class averages twenty-five students, and weightlifting classes average twenty in size. Serving eighty students per period in these three areas decreases class sizes in other areas.

In the Career Technical Education area, more staff have also been added to the culinary arts program so as to serve more students there. The culinary arts kitchen serves thirty students per period in the course of a day.

A classroom originally designed for students participating in Art has been outfitted with computers for classes because the two computer labs are fully utilized throughout the day. A room adjacent to the television studio, originally designed for video editing has been converted for classroom use.

Part of outside storage was redesigned as a carpentry shop.

The seating area in culinary arts is now being utilized as a classroom.

Part of the library was converted to a web-design computer classroom.

A teachers break room was converted to a health science based classroom.

A portion of the central storage area was converted to a marketing classroom.

The Library is used for supportive help and testing due to lack of space.

We are also looking to convert the rest of central storage to additional classroom space.

Due to lack of office space, department chairs and coordinators share office space. Several rooms originally constructed as conference rooms are now used as office space. Several others have been outfitted with student desks so as to allow staff to meet with small groups of students for remediation. Due to current federal, state and Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education regulations, small group instructional classes that serve special education students may not be held in classrooms that are atypical in size or location than those in which other regular education classes are held. This puts further pressure on room availability.

Classes that need access to computer workstations are often held in the library due to the unavailability of computer lab space. Academic Support and grade recovery classes are scheduled into the library/media center daily, due to the lack of available classroom space.

Everett High School is well maintained, as are all of Everett's Public Schools. There is a scheduled service plan in place for the Mechanical/HVAC systems, roofing, fire alarm and fire protection, and other systems as well. The building is painted every four years. The building undergoes a complete inspection, including fire systems, every year and repairs are made when needed.

ENE Systems administers the maintenance program for all components of the building HVAC systems. No capital projects have been undertaken at this school with the exception of converting some underutilized areas of the school to Career Technical Education classroom space.

Everett High School was built for 1800 students. It now has 2,187 students which is 387 students over capacity. With the student population at the high school increasing this problem will continue to get worse.

- 4. Part of outside storage was redesigned into a carpentry shop.

- 8. The library is used for supportive help and testing due to lack of space.

The overcrowding situation at Everett High School has become a major problem. Due to lack of office space, department chairs and coordinators share space. Several rooms originally constructed as conference rooms are now used as office space. Several others have been outfitted with student desks as to allow staff to meet with small groups of students for remediation. Due to current federal, state, and DESE regulations, small group instructional classes that serve special education students may not be held in classrooms that are atypical in size or location that those in which other regular education classes are held. This puts pressure on room availability

Classes that need access to computer workstations are often held in the library due to the unavailability of computer lab space. Academic support and and grade recovery classes are scheduled into the library/media center to the lack of available space.

Question 1: Please describe the conditions within the community and School District that are expected to result in increased enrollment.

The Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) in January of 2014 released a report titled Population and Housing Demand Projections for Metro Boston, Regional Projections and Municipal Forecasts. The MAPC recommends that communities use these projections to anticipate a communities future needs. Data sources include MAPC's Development Database, Census Data from 1990, 2000 and 2010, American Community Survey Data from 2005 to 2011, fertility and mortality information from the Massachusetts Community Health Information Profile and the Census Building Permit Survey Database.

The projection made within this report further reinforce what the community and the Everett Public School District has been experiencing since 2000. More young families with school age children, have and will continue to move into the city. MAPC projections indicate that the population of children under the age of fifteen, will rise from 7,843 in 2010, to 8,883 by the 2020 to 9,770 by 2030.

The City of Everett has issued permits for the construction of 208 units as of early May 2021. Several other major developments have been completed in the last few years with over 500 additional units becoming available at the Batchyard, Pioneer and Wellington Parkside. Several other large scale developments are proposed such as 319 Broadway (20 units), 366 Broadway (24 units) Second St. and Vine St. (320 units), 85 Boston St. (714 units), 605 Broadway (18 units), 787-801 Broadway (77 units), 180 Elm St. (8 units), 10-20 Gledhill Ave. (6 units), 16 Laurel St. (26 units), 68 Main St. (6 units), 108-112 Main St. (6 units), 6 Norman St. (66 units), 34-45 Garvey St. (450 units), Corey St. (50 units), 600 Broadway (85 units) 6 Norman St. (66 units), 65 Norman St. (398 units), 1690 Revere Beach Parkway (714 units), 537 Second St. (40 units), 530-537 Second St. (142 units), 114 Spring St. (366 units), and 110 Tremont St. (48 units), 140 Tremont St. (46 units), 1911 Revere Beach Parkway (153 units), 165-167 Bow St. (149 units), 108 Ferry St. (16 units), 81 Chelsea St. (8 units), 99 East Elm St. (190 units), and 25 Garvey St. (126 units) This brings the total of units proposed or under construction to 4,293.

Bringing 4,293 new units on board in the next few years will certainly bring an increase to the student population in our schools. The increase in living units within the city has contributed to an increase in enrollment. Enrollment in the Everett Public Schools increased drastically in the last ten years.

This is an increase of almost 1,000 students in eleven years. Everett High School exceeded its design capacity in the 2011-2012 school year.

Presently, there are 2,187 students in Grades 9-12. It is expected that these class sizes will continue to expand even further. This expectation is based on the number of units being built in Everett as well as the rise in the birthrate in the last few years. The figures below reflect the birth rate in the city of Everett in the last thirteen years:

Given that Encore Casino/Resorts opened in June of 2019, it is expected to increase the demand for housing needs based on the needs of staffing as citizens of Everett are given priority in the hiring process. Therefore, some individuals seeking employment will move to Everett to gain employment thus increasing our student population.

Question 2: Please describe the measures the School District has taken or is planning to take in the immediate future to mitigate the problem(s) described above.

There are few options available to accommodate the increasing enrollment because Everett High School is the only high school serving the district. The only option available, is to allow class size to continue to increase above the current rate of 19.1. students per class. It must be noted that there are currently 421 classes that have an enrollment exceeding 19.1 students per class. We presently have 355 classes with an enrollment of over 25 students.

Question 3: Please provide a detailed explanation of the impact of the problem described in this priority on your district's educational program. Please include specific examples of how the problem prevents the district from delivering the educational program it is required to deliver and how students and/or teachers are directly affected by the problem identified.

Many of the students who have enrolled at Everett High School over the last several years come to the classroom from all over the world. Although many Everett High School students were born outside of the United States, only 352 students are classified as immigrants, having enrolled in the United States for less than three years. Once a student has attended a United States school for three full years, they are no longer classified as an immigrant. One hundred and eighty-eight students enrolled have arrived in the United States this school year. One thousand four hundred and twenty-one (1,421) students speak a language other than English. The students enrolling at Everett High School, come with very different educational experiences, accessing the curriculum in different ways, from different starting points and learning at different rates. The expectation is that they will learn English and the curriculum, pass the state-mandated tests so as to be eligible for a Massachusetts high school diploma, and become lifelong learners and active members of society is difficult for all this to take place in a classroom that is overcrowded.

Teachers face enormous challenges when they are trying to individualize instruction for these eager learners. Individualizing instruction for twenty-eight students, some of whom are likely English Learners and may or may not be special education students, is far more challenging than it is for twenty or twenty-one students teaching in overcrowded conditions year after year, contributes to teachers leaving the profession within the first five years. This is particularly prevalent among young teachers, and those teachers who are new to the profession. They are expected to excel at a job that is difficult to begin with, but made impossible by large student caseloads.

With an increasing number of English Learners and students on IEPs, we need to accommodate for the smaller class sizes to provide their requisite services. At this time, because of the overcrowding issues, we are nearing a point where we will be unable to provide the services they need to succeed.

Whereas: In 2018, the Everett City Council adopted ordinances standardizing the procedures governing the licenses and permits issued by the City Council; and

Whereas: It makes sense, whenever possible, for all licenses and permits issued under the authority of the city council to use the same standard procedures; and

Whereas: The precious metal dealers license ordinance has not yet been updated to use the standardized procedures for licenses and permits approved by the city council.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts that the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett be amended as follows:

Article IV of Chapter 12 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett are hereby deleted in its entirety;

Chapter 12, Article XI of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett is hereby further amended by adding a new Division 25 as follows:

DIVISION 25. PRECIOUS METALS DEALER LICENSES (C01XX-22)

Section 12-550 Purpose

The city council may, by petition, grant precious metals dealer licenses, as the public good requires and subject to terms and conditions as it sees fit, to such parties deemed appropriate, subject to the provisions of these Revised Ordinances and applicable state statutes.

Section 12-551 Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this division, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

(a) "<u>Precious metals</u>" Any object made, constructed or electroplated with gold, silver or platinum, regardless of its form, weight or appearance.

Section 12-552 Precious metals dealer license required

- (a) No party shall operate as a precious metals dealer within the limits of the city unless such party has first obtained the required license for said purpose from the city council.
- (b) No owner of any property located in whole or in part within the limits of the city shall allow any party to operate as a precious metals dealer on such property unless such party has first obtained the required license for said purpose from the city council.
- (c) Any violations of this section shall be reported to the city clerk. After conferring with the city solicitor and/or the president of the city council, if necessary, the city clerk may:
 - (1) Issue fines in accordance with Section 1-8 of these Revised Ordinances to the party acting as an unlicensed precious metals dealer; and/or
 - (2) Issue fines in accordance with Section 1-8 of these Revised Ordinances to the owner of the property on which any party has been operating as an unlicensed precious metals dealer; and/or
 - (3) Issue a cease and desist order the party operating as an unlicensed precious metals dealer.

Section 12-553 Precious metals dealer license qualifications

All applicants for a precious metals dealer license shall meet the qualifications for all licenses and permits issued under the authority of the city council as prescribed in Section 12-302 of this Chapter.

Section 12-554 Precious metals dealer license

- (a) All applications for precious metals dealer licenses pursuant to this division shall be completed, reviewed and processed in accordance with the provisions of Sections 12-303 of this Chapter.
- (b) Petitions for precious metals dealer licenses shall be considered by the city council in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-309 of this Chapter.
- (c) License conditions and restrictions
 - (1) All precious metals dealer licenses shall be subject to the standard license and permit conditions and restrictions for licenses and permits issued under the authority of the city council as specified in Section 12-308(a) of this Chapter and the following additional conditions:
 - a. Additional inspections conditions

Precious metals dealers or other persons in charge of the licensed premises of such dealers shall allow any police officer or the city clerk, as the agent for the city council, to enter said premises, at any time, to

- 1. Upon demand, examine all items purchased, stored or kept in or upon said premises; and
- 2. Upon demand, examine all records kept by the precious metals dealer.
- (2) Precious metals dealer licenses shall only allow the licensee to operate on the property address for which the license was granted.
- (3) All precious metals dealer licenses shall also be subject to the following conditions and restrictions:
 - a. All holders of precious metal dealer licenses shall comply with the operating standards prescribed in Section 12-554 of this division.
- (4) The city council may impose other reasonable restrictions and conditions on individual precious metals dealer licenses as they deem necessary to protect the public safety and welfare. Such restrictions and conditions may include, but shall not be limited to, limitations on the days and hours of operation.
- (d) Petitions for approved precious metals dealer licenses shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-310 of this Chapter.
- (e) Petitions for denied precious metals dealer licenses shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-311 of this Chapter.
- (f) Renewals of existing precious metals dealer licenses shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-312 of this Chapter.
- (g) The process used to monitor and ensure compliance with the conditions and restrictions placed on precious metals dealer licenses, as well as the possible penalties for such non-compliance are prescribed in Section 12-313 of this Chapter.
- (h) Reviews of existing precious metals dealer licenses shall proceed in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-314 of this Chapter.
- (i) The method used to file and process complaints regarding precious metals dealer licenses is prescribed in Section 12-318 of this Chapter.
- (j) Suspensions of existing precious metals dealer licenses shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-315 of this Chapter.
- (k) Revocations of existing precious metals dealer licenses shall be handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 12-316 of this Chapter.

Section 12-555 Precious metals dealer operating standards

Every precious metals dealer licensed under the provisions of this division shall conform with the following operating standards.

(a) <u>Identification required</u>

- (1) No precious metals dealer shall purchase any item from any seller unless the seller can provide a valid method of identification.
- (2) Valid methods of identification shall include a driver's license, a liquor ID, a military ID, etc.
- (3) Precious metals dealers shall make a photocopy of each seller's method of identification, which will become a part of the transaction's record.

(b) <u>Purchases from minors</u>

No precious metals dealer shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by way of barter or exchange, precious metals items from any person they know or have reason to believe to be a minor.

(c) Purchases to be held

All items purchased, over the counter, by precious metals dealers shall be held for a period of thirty (30) days in their original state before disposing of same.

(d) Records to be kept

- (1) Every precious metals dealer shall keep an accurate and complete transaction log, recording all purchases and sales made over the counter during each business day.
- (2) For purchases, said log shall contain an accurate description of all items purchased including:
 - a. All distinguishing marks and numbers of each item purchased;
 - b. The price paid for the items purchased;
 - c. The date and time when such purchase was made;
 - d. The name and address of the seller; and
 - e. A photocopy of the seller's provided method of identification.
- (3) The information contained in a precious metals dealer daily transaction log shall be delivered to the police department on a regular basis in a format and frequency to be determined by the police chief.

Councilor DiPierro remarked that if someone walked into a Precious Metal Dealer with a shopping cart full of items like this then it could be easily construed that there was something wrong. Chairman Marchese asked if these catalytic converters contained an ID# and Councilor DiPierro responded that he would be willing to postpone so that Police Officer Stephen Panzini could be invited to address any questions the committee had since he was the lead officer on this issue.

- (a) In conformity with the provisions of Sections 2-4, 3-1 and 4-4 of the Charter, the salaries of the mayor, the city council and the school committee are established by ordinance. (A0173-12; A0278-13)
- (b) In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3, Section 1 of the City of Everett Charter, the salary for the position of mayor shall be one hundred eighty-five thousand dollars (\$185,000.00) annually effective January 1, 2020. Thereafter, and on January 1st of each ensuing year, the salary for the position of mayor shall be adjusted by applying the most recently reported three (3) year (calendar year) average of the un-adjusted Consumer Price Index ("CPI"). Said calculation shall be based on applying the aforementioned three (3) year average to the salary in effect as of December 31st of the immediately preceding calendar year.

Section 17C. (a) Notwithstanding section 17 or any other general or special law to the contrary, the city council, the transportation commissioner of the city of Boston, the board of selectmen, park commissioners, a traffic commission or traffic director of a city or town that accepts this section in the manner provided in section 4 of chapter 4 may, in the interests of public safety and without further authority, establish a speed limit of 25 miles per hour on any roadway inside a thickly settled or business district in the city or town on any way that is not a state highway.

(b) Upon establishing a speed limit under this section, the city or town shall notify the department. The operation of a motor vehicle at a speed in excess of a speed limit established under this section shall be a violation of section 17.

That the Everett City Council hereby adopts MGL c. 90 § 17C to create a City-wide 25 mph speed limit on any road that is not a state highway.

Language like this could be added to section 18:

No person shall operate a motor vehicle on a public way in the City of Everett in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour, unless on a State Highway.

It shall be the duty of the chief of police to enforce the provisions of this chapter. Such officers as may be designated by him are hereby authorized and shall be empowered to enforce this regulation on any public way meeting these requirements.

The City of Everett shall post this speed limit on all public ways entering the city which are under the jurisdiction of the city, or at a location as near to an entry point that is under jurisdiction of the city to alert motorists of the speed limit.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be fined in accordance with section <u>1-8</u>.

It shall be the duty of the chief of police to enforce the provisions of this chapter. Such officers as may be designated by him are hereby authorized and shall be empowered to enforce this regulation on any public way meeting these requirements.

The City of Everett shall post this speed limit on all public ways entering the city which are under the jurisdiction of the city, or at a location as near to an entry point that is under jurisdiction of the city to alert motorists of the speed limit.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be fined in accordance with section <u>1-8</u>.

The Ordinance would limit the speed on all streets in the City of Everett to 25 MPH with the exceptions of State Highways, Chelsea Street, Ferry Street and Second Street. Councilor DiPierro remarked that he was hopeful that this Ordinance would help keep our neighborhoods safer.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts that the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett be amended as follows:

Chapter 18, Article IV Operations of Vehicles is hereby amended by adding a new Section 18-105 as follows:

Section 18-105. Enforcement of a city-wide twenty-five mph speed limit (C0089-22)

- (a) No person shall operate a motor vehicle on a public way in the city in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour, unless on a state highway, Chelsea Street, Ferry Street and Second Street.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the chief of police to enforce the provisions of this section. Officers designated by the chief of police are hereby authorized and shall be empowered to enforce this regulation on any public way meeting these requirements.

- (c) The city shall post this speed limit on all public ways entering the city which are under the jurisdiction of the city, or at a location as near to an entry point that is under jurisdiction of the city to alert motorists of the speed limit.
- (d) Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be fined in accordance with Section 1-8 of these Revised Ordinances.

CITY OF EVERETT, MASSACHUSETTS BOARD OF HEALTH WORKPLACE SMOKING RESTRICTIONS

A. Statement of Purpose:

Whereas conclusive evidence exists that tobacco smoke causes cancer, respiratory and cardiac diseases, negative birth outcomes, irritations to the eyes, nose, and throat; and whereas the harmful effects of tobacco smoke are not confined to smokers but also cause severe discomfort and illness to nonsmokers; and whereas environmental tobacco smoke [hereinafter ETS], which includes both exhaled smoke and the side stream smoke from burning cigarettes, causes the death of 53,000 Americans each year (McGinnis JM, Foege W, "Actual Causes of Death in the United States", JAMA 1993 270:2207-2212); and whereas in 2000, the Public Health Service's National Toxicology Program listed environmental tobacco smoke as a known human carcinogen (U.S. DHHS, 2000, citing Cal. EPA, 1997); now, therefore, the Board of Health of Everett recognizes the right of those who wish to breathe smoke free air and establishes this regulation to protect and improve the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking in workplaces.

- **B.** Authority: This regulation is promulgated under the authority granted to the Everett Board of Health under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 111, Section 31 that "[b]oards of health may make reasonable health regulations."
- **C. Definitions:** For the purposes of this regulation the following words shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this paragraph:

Business Agent: An individual who has been designated by the owner or operator of any establishment to be the manager or otherwise in charge of said establishment.

Board: The Board of Health of the city of Everett.

City: The city of Everett.

Employee: Any person who performs services for an employer.

Employer: A person, partnership, association, corporation, trust, or other organized group of individuals, including the city of Everett or any agency thereof, which utilizes the services of one (1) or more individual employees.

Enclosed: A space bounded by walls (with or without windows) continuous from the floor to the ceiling and enclosed by doors, including, but not limited to, offices, rooms, halls and vehicles.

Definition of Long Term Care Facility: A convalescent home, nursing home, rest home or charitable home for the aged licensed under the provisions for Section 71 of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 111.

Definition of Nursing Home: Any institution or facility providing nursing care which is licensed under Massachusetts General Law Chapter 111, Section 71 or under any other law of the commonwealth, including but not limited to convalescent homes, charitable homes for the aged."

Person: Any individual, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind including, but not limited to an owner, operator, manager, proprietor or person in charge of any building, establishment, business, or restaurant or retail store, or the business agents or designees of any of the foregoing.

Private Club: A not-for-profit establishment created and organized pursuant to M.G.L. Ch. 180 as a charitable corporation with a defined membership. A private club is not a place of public accommodation but rather distinctly private. Criteria used to determine whether a club is distinctly private include, but are not limited to, those factors identified in 204 CMR 10.02. If the private club holds an alcoholic beverage license, said license shall be a "club license" or a "war veterans club license" as defined in M.G.L. Ch. 138, §12 and by the Massachusetts Alcohol Beverage Control Commission. Said license is subject to the terms set forth by the local licensing authority.

Public place: Any building or facility owned, leased, operated or occupied by the municipality, including school buildings or grounds and municipal vehicles; any enclosed area open to the general public including, but not limited to, retail stores, retail food stores, libraries, museums, theaters, banks, laundromats, indoor sports arenas and/or recreational facilities, auditoriums, bingo/beano, inn/hotel/motel lobbies, private and public educational facilities, shopping malls, public restrooms, lobbies, staircases, halls, exits, entrance ways, elevators accessible to the public and licensed child-care locations.

Public transportation vehicle: Buses, taxis, and other means of transportation available to the general public while such means of transportation is operating within the boundaries of the city.

Smoking: Inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, or other lighted tobacco product in any form.

Third Party Contractor: Any person or company who performs services for a membership or lessees.

Workplace: Any enclosed area of a structure or portion thereof at which one (1) or more employees perform services for their employer.

D. Smoking Prohibited:

1. Smoking is prohibited in all workplaces, all public places, all public transportation vehicles, and all private clubs.

2. It shall be unlawful for any employer or other person having control of the premises upon which smoking is prohibited by this regulation, or the business agent or designee of such person, to permit a violation of this regulation.

E. Posting notice of prohibition:

Every person having control of premises upon which smoking is prohibited by and under the authority of this Board of Health Regulation shall conspicuously display upon the premises and at all entrances "No Smoking" signs or the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) and "by order of the Board of Health" with a phone number specified by the Board of Health. No person shall remove a sign posted under the authority of this Board of Health Regulation.

F. Exceptions:

Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph D of this regulation, smoking may be permitted in the following places and/or circumstances:

- 1. Private residences, except those portions used as a child care or health care office when operating as such.
- 2. Hotel and motel rooms rented to guests that are designated as "smoking rooms", provided that no more than 25% of rooms shall be allocated as such. A room so assigned shall have signs posted indicating that smoking is allowed therein and shall have self-closing doors. No change in room designations shall take place without prior written approval of the Board of Health.
- 3. Smoking by residents and patients of nursing homes and long-term care facilities may be permitted in one separately enclosed designated smoking room, provided that the air in the designated smoking room does not interfere with the smoke-free air in the remainder of the facility.
- 4. Retail tobacco stores, which are primarily for the sale of tobacco products and paraphernalia, in which the sale of other products is merely incidental, prohibit minors from entering the establishment and are not required to possess a retail food permit.

G. Violations:

It shall be the responsibility of the employer and/or his or her business agent to ensure compliance with all sections of this regulation pertaining to his/her place of business or any person in violation of any section of this regulation. The violator shall receive:

- 1. In the case of a first violation, a fine of one hundred dollars (\$100.00).
- 2. In the case of a second violation within 24 months of the date of the first violation, a fine of two hundred dollars (\$200.00).
- 3. In the case of three or more violations within 24 months of the current violation, a fine of three hundred dollars (\$300.00).
- 4. Any establishment who does not pay the assessed fine within twenty-one days from fine issuance may be subject to criminal proceedings.

H. Enforcement:

As an alternative to initiating criminal proceedings, violations of this Board of Health Regulation may be enforced in the manner provided in MGL chap 40, sect. 21D, by the Board of Health and its designees. Any fines imposed under the provisions of this Board of Health Regulation shall ensure to the City of Everett for such use as the city may direct.

One method of enforcement may be periodic, unannounced inspections of those establishments subject to this regulation. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this regulation may request that the Board of Health initiate an investigation.

I. Non-Criminal Disposition:

Whoever violates any provision of this regulation the violation of which is subject to a specific penalty, may be penalized by the non-criminal method of disposition as provided in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D or by filing a criminal complaint at the appropriate venue.

Each day on which any violation exists shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

Penalty:

\$100 for the first offense

\$200 for the second offense

\$300 for the third or subsequent offense

Enforcing Persons: Everett Board of Health and its designees

J. Severability:

If any paragraph or provision of this regulation is found to be illegal or against public policy or unconstitutional, it shall not affect the legality of any remaining paragraphs or provisions.

K. Conflict with Other Laws or Regulations:

Notwithstanding the provisions of the foregoing Paragraph D of this regulation, nothing in this regulation shall be deemed to amend or repeal applicable fire, health or other regulations so as to permit smoking in areas where it is prohibited by such fire, health or other regulations.

L. Effective Date:

This regulation was adopted on November 18, 2003. It shall be effective as of the date of implementation of the state of Massachusetts' smoking ban, which at the time this regulation was passed was set to be July 5, 2004. However, this regulation shall be implemented no later than August 1, 2004.





Whereas: The theft of catalytic converters has been on the rise; and

Whereas: The Everett Police Department have expressed the need for stricter regulations; and

Whereas: The City Council has a duty to address this growing concern among residents.

Now, therefore, by the authority granted to the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts to make ordinances;

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts that the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett be amended as follows:

Chapter 12, Article XI, Division 25 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett is hereby amended by inserting a new version of Section 12-555(d) as follows and resequencing the current version of said subsection accordingly:

(d) <u>Catalytic converter transactions restrictions</u>
(C0077-22)

No precious metals dealer shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by way of barter or exchange, catalytic converters from any business or individual who is not a representative of a licensed motor vehicle body shop or motor vehicle repair shop.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage by the City Council and subsequent approval by His Honor the Mayor.
