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

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



SCOPE OF WORK:

TEP Northeast (TEP NE) has been authorized by AT&T to conduct a structural evaluation of the proposed utility pole supporting the proposed AT&T equipment.

This report represents this office's findings, conclusions and recommendations pertaining to the support of the proposed AT&T equipment listed below.

This office conducted an on-site visual survey of the above areas on August 29, 2022.

CONCLUSION SUMMARY:

Based on our evaluation, we have determined that the proposed pole <u>is in conformance</u> with the National Electric Safety Code 2017 (NESC). <u>The utility pole structure is rated at 59.8%.</u>

PROPOSED STRUCTURE:

The proposed 34'-0" +/- wood pole is assumed to be Southern Pine Class 3 (Fb = 8000 psi) with a 11.46" diameter base. If field conditions differ from what is assumed in this report, then the engineer of record is to be notified as soon as possible.

ANTENNA SUPPORT RECOMMENDATIONS:

The proposed antenna will be installed on a proposed top mount kit secured to the proposed wood pole using thru bolts.

RRH SUPPORT RECOMMENDATIONS:

The proposed RRH's will be installed within a proposed equipment cabinet secured to the side of the proposed pole using thru bolts.

EQUIPMENT SUPPORT RECOMMENDATIONS:

The proposed equipment will be installed on the existing wood pole using the approved manufacturer's mount.

Limitations and assumptions:

- 1. Reference the latest TEP NE construction drawings for all the equipment locations details.
- 2. Mount all equipment per manufacturer's specifications.
- 3. All structural members and their connections are assumed to be in good condition and are free from defects with no deterioration to their member capacities. Contractor to perform pre-inspection prior to construction.
- 4. All antennas and waveguide cables are assumed to be properly installed and supported as per the manufacturer's requirements.
- 5. TEP NE is not responsible for any modifications completed prior to and hereafter in which TEP NE was not directly involved.
- 6. If field conditions differ from what is assumed in this report, then the engineer of record is to be notified as soon as possible.
- 7. TEP NE did not perform any geotechnical analysis / or / investigation. Soil Information is unknown.



1. Overview

New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC ("AT&T") is providing the following information in support of its application to the City of Everett to construct and operate a telecommunications facility ("Facility") in Everett for its Personal Communication Services. The proposed Facility is to be located on/near 9 Gladstone St , Everett, MA 02149 (the "Site"). The Facility is needed to provide coverage that would otherwise be lost due to the need to vacate AT&Ts small cell location at 2 Gladstone, St Everett due to work that National Grid is proposing. Loss of current small cell located around #2 Gladstone will create capacity issues that cannot be resolved by other means in the area of Gladstone, Revere Beach Parkway and Broadway. This report addresses AT&T's need for the proposed Facility at the Site and confirms that there are no superior existing structures, buildings or towers in this part of Everett that would meet AT&T's coverage and capacity objectives for this area.

Included in this package are a brief summary of the proposed Facility's objectives, qualifications of the RF Frequency Engineer, and radio frequency ("RF") coverage plots showing the predicted propagation of the proposed Facility based on the antenna mounting height necessary to achieve AT&T's goals.

2. AT&T's Proposed Facility

As shown on the zoning drawing plans submitted with the application, AT&T proposes to construct, operate and maintain a small cell personal wireless service Facility consisting principally of the following elements:

- One (1) Utility pole (measuring 34'" in height).
- One (1) antenna (measuring 24.7 inches in height) mounted to the existing utility pole.
- One (1) remote radio head units (RRH) shroud (measuring 32 inches in height)
- Fiber optic and DC power cables running from aforementioned RRH shroud, along the light pole, to the new electric meter.

- The proposed small wireless facility will not interfere with the frequencies used by the city or any other public safety agency for public safety communications
- As with every transmitter and location in AT&Ts nationwide network, the
 transmitters proposed here will be remotely monitored for proper operations as
 well as internal self-diagnostics to ensure transmitters operate in the
 appropriate band and power. Additional diagnostics will analyze overall system
 performance and cease operation if measurements are out of specifications.

4.GIS / Coverage Map of all AT&T location and proposed locations

To demonstrate why the proposed Facility is necessary, I have developed the following radio frequency coverage maps:

These coverage maps were generated using Forsk Atoll, an RF Propagation computer modeling program. The software takes into account the geographical features of an area, antenna models, antenna heights and RF transmitting power. The symbols depict existing wireless facility site locations. The areas in blue will have adequate outdoor or "in-vehicle" coverage, but insufficient signal strength for reliable inbuilding service. The areas in green will have good in-building service as well.

The map titled "Current AT&T PCS Coverage in Everett Near Rtes. 16 and 99" shows the existing sites and conditions at 1900Mhz and that without a replacement a gap in coverage and capacity will be created. The map titled "Proposed AT&T PCS Coverage in Everett Near Rtes. 16 and 99" shows that the proposed Facility at the Site is necessary to fill coverage gaps, address capacity issues and upgrade AT&T's wireless service in and around the Targeted Coverage Area.

Summary

No other existing structures are better suited than the subject Site to provide the coverage and capacity requirements needed for this area of Everett, Massachusetts. The location and the Facility configuration were chosen to achieve an optimal balance between meeting coverage objectives and minimizing the aesthetic impact to the community while fully complying with the Everett small cell permitting guidelines. The Facility will comply with all applicable FCC regulations regarding RF emissions and other matters. The proposed Facility site is feasible and appropriate and will improve wireless service along Salisbury Street and the surrounding vicinity.





PURPOSE

I have reviewed the information pertinent to the proposed installation at the above location. To determine regulatory compliance, theoretical calculations of maximal radio-frequency (RF) fields have been prepared for the proposed site. The physical conditions are that AT&T Mobility proposes to install an antenna along with a remote radio head unit on a utility pole in Everett, MA (See Figure 2 map for location).

This report considers the contributions of the proposed AT&T Mobility PWS transmitters operating at their proposed FCC licensed capacities. The calculated values of RF fields are presented as a percent of current Maximum Permissible Exposures (%MPE) as adopted by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), iii and those established by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). iii

SUMMARY

Theoretical RF field calculations data indicate the summation of the proposed AT&T Mobility PWS contributions at the proposed Small Cell facility in Everett, MA, would be within the established RF exposure guidelines; see Figure 3. This includes all publicly accessible areas, and the surrounding neighborhood in general. The results support compliance with the pertinent sections of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health regulations regarding PWS facilities, and the FCC's guidelines for RF exposure.

Based on the results of the theoretical RF fields I have calculated; it is my expert opinion that the proposed Small Cell facility would comply with all regulatory guidelines for RF exposure with the proposed AT&T Mobility antenna and transmitter installations.

Note: The analyses, conclusions and professional opinions are based upon the precise parameters and conditions of this particular site; AT&T SC PWS facility mounted on a utility pole in Everett, MA. Utilization of these analyses, conclusions, and professional opinions for any personal wireless services installation, existing or proposed, other than the aforementioned has not been sanctioned by the author, and therefore should not be accepted as evidence of regulatory compliance.

EXPOSURE LIMITS AND GUIDELINES




Figure 1: FCC Limits for Maximum Permissible Exposure (MPE)

RF exposure guidelines enforced by the FCC were established by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE)^{iv} and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP). The RF exposure guidelines are listed for RF workers and members of the public. The applicable FCC RF exposure guidelines for the public are listed in Table 1 and depicted in Figure 1. All listed values are intended to be averaged over any contiguous 30-minute period. NOTE: The values for the public assume 24 hours/day exposure, seven days a week. Also note the values for "workers" are five times the values for members of the public, albeit averaged over six minutes.

INTRODUCTORY INFORMATION: MAKING SENSE OF THE "G"S

There are many references to the so-called "generation" of wireless technologies in use. Each new "generation" of wireless technologies has colloquially been designated a numbered "G." The latest "G" to come out, the fifth generation of wireless technologies or so called "5G", has attracted extensive research interest, both inside and outside the scientific community. According to the 3rd generation partnership project, 5G networks should support three major families of applications: (1) Enhanced mobile broadband; (2) Machine type communications, and (3) Ultra-reliable and low-latency communications. There are also enhanced "vehicle-to-everything" communications which are expected to be supported by 5G networks. These situations require much more "connectivity" than the latest fourth generation (aka "4G" or "Long Term Evolution (LTE)") networks can handle. Thus, new networks must be able to handle this high system throughput, in addition to supporting existing older technologies still in use. This is being accomplished through additional spectrum assignments both higher and lower than currently assigned frequencies used by PWS facilities. In fact, currently deployed 5G networks are operating at frequencies once used by television stations.

Nonetheless, frequencies assigned by the FCC for 5G use are all within the bands currently under regulatory oversight, including setting safe limits of exposure to RF energy for both workers, and members of the public. Just recently (4/2020) the FCC has reaffirmed the efficacy of their regulatory exposure limits to RF energy, including those for 5G. From an RF safety standpoint, there is nothing peculiar about the fifth generation of wireless technologies that would set it apart from any of the other advancements of technologies; including the first two generations (first analog then digital communications), the third generation (the first to be referred to a numbered-series as "3G"), and the currently deployed fourth generations (LTE). Recently published studies in peer-reviewed journals^{vii} have shown typical exposures to RF energy from operating 5G systems to be well-within the exposure limits.

The FCC currently has categories of devices operating in the Citizens Broadband Radio Service (CBRS) 3.5 GHz band. Category "A" refers to a lower power base station and Categories "B" and "C" refer to CBRS devices that must be deployed outdoors and have higher maximum power limits compared with Category A devices. Category A devices have a maximum allowable Equivalent Isotropically Radiated Power (EIRP) limit per 10 MHz of 30 dBm (1 watt), while Categories B and C have EIRP limits of 47 dBm (50 watts) and 62 dBm (1585 watts), respectively.

PWS "Generations": 1G: Analog voice; 2G: Digital voice; 3G: Mobile data; 4G: LTE and mobile Internet; 5G: Mobile networks interconnect people, control machines, objects, and devices with multi-Gbps peak rates and ultra-low latency.




Figure 2: Utility Pole Within Everett, MA

OBSERVATIONS IN CONSIDERATION WITH FCC RULES §1.1307(B) & §1.1310

Will it be physically possible to stand next to or touch any omnidirectional antenna and/or stand in front of a directional antenna?

NO; access to the utility pole is restricted, and the sites will adhere to established RF safety guidelines regarding the transmitting antennas, including the appropriate signage.

ANTENNA & TRANSMITTER PARAMETERS

The transmitter and antenna data and supporting parameters for the proposed a AT&T "Small Cell" site (See Figure 2) in Everett, MA are contained in Table 2. See **Appendix A** for Remote Radio Head Unit (RRH or RRU) specifications and **Appendix B** for specifications & patterns of energy for the proposed omni-directional cannister antenna.

THEORETICAL RF FIELD CALCULATIONS - GROUND LEVELS METHODOLOGY

These calculations are based on what are called "worst-case" estimates. That is, the estimates assume 100% use of all transmitters simultaneously, and assume the surrounding area is a flat plane.

The calculations are based on the following information:

- 1. Effective Radiated Power (ERP) (See Table 2 and Appendix A data).
- Antenna height (centerline, above ground level (AGL)).
 Trigonometry was used to determine the resultant "RANGE," and the antenna depression angle.
- 3. Antenna vertical energy patterns; the source of the negative gain (G) values. See Appendix B. Most antennas, even so-called "omni-directional" antennas, are designed to focus the RF signal, resulting in "patterns" of signal loss and gain. Antenna vertical energy patterns display the loss of signal strength relative to the direction of propagation due to elevation angle changes.

The magnitude of the RF field (the power density (S)) from an isotropic RF source is calculated making use of the power density formula as outlined in FCC's OET Bulletin 65, Edition 97-01: viii

$$S = \underbrace{P \cdot G}_{4 \cdot \pi \cdot R^2}$$

Where:

 $P \rightarrow Power to antenna (watts)$

G → Gain of antenna

 $R \rightarrow Distance$ (range) from antenna source to point of intersection with the ground (feet)

 $R^2 = (Height)^2 + (Horizontal distance)^2$

Since: $P \cdot G = EIRP$ (Effective Isotropic Radiated Power), and for the situation of off-axis power density calculations, apply the negative elevation gain (G^E) value from the vertical energy patterns with the following formula:

$$S = \underbrace{EIRP \cdot G^{E}}_{4 \cdot \pi \cdot R^{2}}$$

Ground reflections may add in-phase with the direct wave, and essentially double the electric field intensity. Because power density is proportional to the *square* of the electric field, the power density <u>may</u> quadruple, that is, increase by a factor of four (4). Since ERP is routinely used, convert ERP into EIRP by multiplying by the factor of 1.64 (the gain of a ½-wave dipole relative to an isotropic radiator).

$$S = \underbrace{4 \cdot (ERP \cdot 1.64) \cdot G^{E}}_{4 \cdot \pi \cdot R^{2}} = \underbrace{ERP \cdot 1.64 \cdot G^{E}}_{\pi \cdot R^{2}} = \underbrace{0.522 \cdot ERP \cdot G^{E}}_{R^{2}}$$

To calculate the % MPE, use the formula:

$$\% \text{ MPE} = \underbrace{\text{S}}_{\text{MPE}} \cdot 100$$

Note that any loss along the horizontal direction was neglected; the results would then be the maximum values in any direction. The resultant values are thus conservative in that they over predict actual resultant power densities.

RESULTS




Figure 3: Theoretical Cumulative Maximum Percent MPE - vs. - Distance

The results of the %MPE calculations for the summation of the proposed AT&T Mobility RF emissions are depicted in Figure 3 as plotted against linear distance from the base of the proposed utility pole in Everett, MA. The values have been calculated for a height of six feet above ground level in accordance with regulatory rationale. In addition, although not required by FCC regulations, values have been calculated for a height of 16' AGL as well; similar to the height of a 2nd story structure.

CONCLUSION

Theoretical RF field calculations data indicate the summation of the proposed AT&T Mobility PWS contributions at the proposed Small Cell facility in Everett, MA, would be within the established RF exposure guidelines; see Figure 3. This includes all publicly accessible areas, and the surrounding neighborhood in general. The results support compliance with the pertinent sections of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health regulations regarding PWS facilities, and the FCC's guidelines for RF exposure.

The number and duration of calls passing through PWS facilities cannot be accurately predicted. Thus, to estimate the highest RF fields possible from operation of these installations, the maximal amount of usage was considered. Even in this so-called "worst-case," the resultant increase in RF field levels is far below established levels considered safe.

Based on the results of the theoretical RF fields I have calculated; it is my expert opinion that the proposed Small Cell facility would comply with all regulatory guidelines for RF exposure with the proposed AT&T Mobility antenna and transmitter installations.

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

To authorize the expenditure of \$1,000,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for the Everett Youth Initiative Council (EYIC) as part of their participatory budget process to seek input and recommendations from young people across the City of Everett on how that portion of ARPA dollars should be spent in accordance with all applicable federal and state spending requirements and restrictions.

Goals of PB in Everett

Participatory budgeting (PB) is an effective process to engage students, parents, educators, and staff in directly deciding how to spend a part of a budget. It develops trust between community members and local government, leadership in young people through critical thinking, and involves the community for a lifetime of meaningful civic experiences.

Previously we, the Everett Youth Initiative Council, (EYIC) shared an outline of Participatory Budgeting (PB). We want Everett's PB (named "Students Engaged in Action" (SEA)) to emphasize young people (ages 12-22), however, all ages are welcome to participate! This document serves to provide insight into where we currently are in implementing PB, an update of our timeline, as well as sharing more specifics about what PB would look like. What we want to come before the city council is a \$1 million allocation of ARPA funds to this transformative process where projects that come out will be funded when the people vote. Because funding is limited, all projects must be "capital," one-time installations (meaning little to no annual expense on behalf of the city).

We hope PB can become a collaborative bridge between young people and the city of Everett.

Idea Collection (Finished by week of 5/8)

We have already started collecting ideas from young people. By presenting to 7th and 8th graders at the Keverian middle school and community events, we currently have 200+ submissions on how \$1 million would best serve community needs. However, for transparency, idea collection wasn't perfect; there are challenges that we are actively addressing.


Firstly, many submissions identified broad issues and not capital projects that would alleviate those issues. To help with this, for example, we will guide issues (such as "better school lunches") into ideas that help with that issue (such as "installing pizza ovens for better pizza").

Secondly, we realize that 200+ ideas are not enough. We aim to gather as many, well-developed ideas as possible from the community by presenting at assemblies for every grade in Everett High, other middle schools (including the Pioneer Charter), and more community events to gain a broader youth perspective across Everett.

Developing Ideas into Proposals (Finished by week of 6/10)

In this step, youth living in Everett (including EYIC members) can volunteer to become "budget delegates" (SEA members) to narrow down the ideas collected from the community and turn them into **15 feasible, well-planned proposals** (which may be less since some ideas may be dropped during development for feasibility reasons). Some proposals may come out of many

submissions identifying very broad issues. For example, SEA members may want 30+ submissions for better mental health transformed into a proposal to address that issue by proposing art murals inside schools and on streets!



Inspired by Cambridge PB's process, we will prioritize ideas—based on need, impact, and feasibility—to be developed. Here, we ask to closely collaborate with the relevant city departments as well as experts to check the feasibility of the location(s) that the budget delegates choose and to estimate the cost. This may be through emails, meetings, with city staff, or visits to the proposed site installation. In this step, we hope young community members can gain trust, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills by collaborating with local government staff!

Below is the format that SEA members will fill out for a finalized proposal which will be used on the ballot.

After the school year starts (late August), SEA members (including EYIC) will inform the community about the developed projects and the community vote in September. We hope this outreach could be a community effort with nonprofits and leaders spreading the word, flyers on bus stops, and social media. Physical ballots will be sent to schools for students to fill out and will remain open for 2 weeks. Anyone, including underage or undocumented folks, can vote without the requirement for ID.

We will use a rank-choice voting system with proposals having a cost estimate on the ballot. The proposals that are selected from this PB process will be in the order of popularity and continue down the list until it reaches a total of \$1 million.

Ways and Means Committee March 20, 2023

The Committee on Ways and Means met on Monday, March 20, 2023 at 6:00pm in the City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor John Hanlon, presiding; Councilors Darren Costa, Vivian Nguyen and Stephanie Smith.

The Committee met on an Order offered by Councilor Michael Marchese, as President: An Order requesting the approval of an appropriation of \$250,000 from Budgetary Fund Balance into the Solicitor's Litigation/Professional Services account.

City Solicitor Colleen Mejia was also present.

Councilor Costa mentioned previous attorney invoices he received that had a number of redactions in which he was seeking more information and asked if the information could be obtained in Executive Session. Solicitor Mejia explained that all City employees and appointed – elected officials including herself were subject to the US Attorney and Department of Justice inquiry. She stated that she doesn't have all information or access to it. Solicitor Mejia provided an overview of the discrimination inquiry which was occurring based on media accounts. She stated that the City hired a law firm that was the best of the best which had a former US Attorney and former Assistant US Attorney representing the City. Councilor Smith referenced the inquiry start timeframe and remarked that she didn't believe any of the new City Councilors would be involved in the inquiry. Councilor Smith questioned the amount of time the lead attorneys were working on it and wondered if there were any duplications or if it was work that the Junior Associates could have performed at a cheaper cost. Solicitor Mejia assured the Committee that the Junior Associates were doing grunt work and that there were no duplications by the lead attorneys. She explained that the first phase was to provide the US Attorney office with documents they requested and that she expected that the next phase would begin in a few weeks in which they would begin interviewing City employees who will be represented by the attorneys hired. Solicitor Mejia indicated that the attorneys hired had also conducted an internal review of the documents provided to the US Attorney's office and found a few deficiencies that are now being corrected as it relates to policies and training. Councilor Smith inquired to who the School Department had representing them in this inquiry and Solicitor Mejia noted that they also had hired a former US Attorney. Solicitor Mejia informed the Committee that the School Department had budgeted \$200,000 this fiscal year for legal representation and is proposing a budget for next fiscal year for legal representation in the amount of \$696,000. She remarked that the City could have saved some money if the Schools had utilized the same Attorneys as the City had hired. Councilor Smith stated that the City Council should be privy to this information and mentioned that we are one City. She asked Solicitor Mejia if she could have the US Attorney's office provide a letter to the City Council confirming what the elected officials can see or not see as it related to this inquiry especially where they need to answer to their constituents regarding these costs. Councilor Costa asked who the attorneys would be representing and Solicitor Mejia responded that they would be representing anyone in their scope of employment with the City of Everett. The Committee inquired into the reason for the May legal invoices and Solicitor Mejia explained that it had

nothing to do with the inquiry and that invoice was a result of a City Council requesting a response to allegations made against the Mayor by media sources. Chairman Hanlon asked if the \$250,000 would be sufficient to the end of the fiscal year and Solicitor Mejia noted that she had received a February legal invoice in the amount of \$99,000 which would deplete her current account and indicated that she was unsure if she would need more money or not. Chairman Hanlon asked when the Solicitor expected all of this to end and Solicitor Mejia responded that hopefully it would end in late Spring. Councilor Smith requested further time on the matter. Councilor Costa requested that Solicitor Mejia have the US Attorney's office provide a letter to the City Council confirming what the elected officials can see or not see as it related to this inquiry – that contact information at the US Attorney's office be provided – legal invoices related to the inquiry from the School Department be provided – and that the CFO provide updated information on May legal invoices to the City.

COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee on Ways and Means met on Monday, May 15, 2023 at 6:00pm in the City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor John Hanlon, presiding; Councilors Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith. Member absent was Councilor Vivian Nguyen.

Communication received from Councilor Nguyen that she would be away on vacation and unable to attend.

The Committee met on an Order offered by Councilor Michael Marchese, as President: An Order requesting the approval of an appropriation of \$250,000 from Budgetary Fund Balance into the Solicitor's Litigation/Professional Services account.

City Solicitor Colleen Mejia was also present.

Solicitor Mejia informed the Committee that the Chief Financial Officer Eric Demas was able to find available funds from various City Department accounts that could be transferred to cover the updated request for \$350,000 to fund the Solicitor's Litigation/Professional Services Account to cover costs associated with invoices received from the City's outside legal Counsel as it relates to the United States Title VII inquiry. Councilor Smith expressed concern about the process and felt that the City and Schools appeared to be treating the confidentially aspect of the matter differently. She also noted that the invoicing for the City seemed to indicate that the Law firm partners were charging the city for 90% of the work and only 10% for law associates whereas the invoicing for the schools was split 50/50% for partners and associates. Solicitor Mejia explained that the summary of detail on future invoices will change and she referenced that the partners were in extensive conversations with the US Attorney's office and that this was not something the Associates would be working on. Councilor Smith responded that she was pleased to hear that. Councilor Costa asked if there was a list of city employees that met with the US Attorney's office and Solicitor Mejia acknowledged that there was only one employee at this time that has met with the US Attorney. Councilor Costa inquired to what documents were provided to US Attorney and if they were accessible public records and Solicitor Mejia noted that there were 42 public record exemptions that inleuded personnel files and privileged documents. Councilor Costa asked what was the value for the money being spent on this matter and Solicitor Mejia stated that the value was having former US Attorney's navigating the Department of Justice system while representing the City and not individuals. Councilor Smith recommended that the order be amended to reflect the transfer of funds from:



Dear Members of the Ways & Means Committee:

We write to respond to your request made through City Solicitor Colleen Mejia concerning the inquiry being conducted by the U.S. Department of Justice and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Massachusetts (collectively, the "Department of Justice") and related invoices for legal work performed by Greenberg Traurig, LLP.

As counsel to the City of Everett in connection with the pending Title VII inquiry, Greenberg Traurig serves as an advisor and advocate for the City and maintains regular communication with the City – particularly with the City Solicitor and her designees – concerning this representation. The relationship between Greenberg Traurig and the City is a fiduciary one in which Greenberg Traurig occupies a position of trust, confidence, and undivided loyalty.

The City has instructed Greenberg Traurig that it wishes to cooperate fully in the government's inquiry. The work undertaken by Greenberg Traurig involves a review of the City's activities as well as interactions with the Department of Justice concerning actions by the City that may potentially constitute violations of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, which prohibits discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or disability as well as retaliation. The City acts through its employees and authorized representatives, and the work we have undertaken necessarily involves a review of the actions of individuals within the

City. At the present time, in order to ensure that the internal review is conducted properly, it is in the best interest of the City to maintain confidentiality concerning the details of the inquiry, including the identification of individuals with whom we interact, the nature of information we learn, the content of historical communications, our analysis of the issues, and our communications with Department of Justice. Among other things, because Greenberg Traurig's work involves the review of communications and the interview of witnesses, maintaining confidentiality encourages employees to cooperate in the process. Confidentiality protects the City, the subjects of the inquiry, and the participants in the inquiry from gossip, speculation, and potential retaliation and helps to ensure the integrity of the inquiry.

As required to ensure a complete and thorough review of internal matters and to respond to requests by the Department of Justice, Greenberg Traurig has interacted with some City employees and authorized representatives. However, because to do otherwise may jeopardize the integrity of the internal review, counsel has maintained the details of the inquiry as confidential. This practice is consistent with the practice of outside counsel engaged in sensitive matters such as internal reviews initiated by a government inquiry or investigation. In all events, we expect that we will share a report of our findings with you at the conclusion of the inquiry.

As counsel to the City, we will continue zealously to protect the City's interests and look forward to resolving this matter as quickly as possible.

COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee on Ways and Means met on Monday, May 15, 2023 at 6:00pm in the City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor John Hanlon, presiding; Councilors Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith. Member absent was Councilor Vivian Nguyen.

Communication received from Councilor Nguyen that she would be away on vacation and unable to attend.

The Committee met on an Order offered by Councilor Michael Marchese, as President: An Order requesting the approval of an appropriation by borrowing in the amount of \$144,000 for the purpose of paying the costs associated with the purchase of three 2023 Ford Explorer Hybrid model vehicles.

DPW Business Manager Brian McCarthy was also present.

Councilor Smith expressed concern over the accuracy of the vehicle inventory list that was recently provided to the City Council. Mr. McCarthy explained that some data entry errors in the excel spreadsheet may have made it appear that way. He noted that the City has 214 pieces of equipment with 185 those being vehicles. He stated that a number of older vehicles are being retired and that recently the City Council approved the disposition of 23 vehicles. He informed the Committee that the three new hybrid vehicles would be used in the Highway, Parks and Cemetery Departments with National Grid helping to install charging stations at no cost while also offering the City some rebates. Councilor Smith asked if the new vehicles would be taken home and Mr. McCarthy indicated that they would but only from home to work while noting that they would be installed with GPS tracking devices that will allow the City to set parameters and look at real time activity usage of the vehicles. Councilor Smith remarked that she was looking forward to seeing these GPS reports. Councilor Costa mentioned that he was concerned that the City was not chasing money for funding these vehicles that might be available from the Federal government. Mr. McCarthy assured him that the City was working with NStar as well as the grant writer in the Planning Department on potential funding sources, but Councilor Costa felt the City was behind the eight ball compared to other communities in replacing the older gas vehicles with new technology. Mr. McCarthy noted that the State was pushing the green initiative as it related to replacing municipal vehicles and was hoping that some State funding would also come along with it. Councilor Costa asked if the City has explored having employees using their own vehicles and Mr. McCarthy responded that there were a host of issues to doing that which included insurance, emergency lights, signage and communication devices.

The Committee voted 2 to 1 with Councilor Costa in opposition: to report back to the City Council with a favorable recommendation as amended to the transfer of the following department accounts to fund the City Solicitors Litigation/Professional Services Account:

The Committee on Ways and Means met on Monday, May 15, 2023 at 6:00pm in the City Council Chambers at City Hall.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor John Hanlon, presiding; Councilors Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith. Member absent was Councilor Vivian Nguyen.

Communication received from Councilor Nguyen that she would be away on vacation and unable to attend.

The Committee met on an Order offered by Councilor Michael Marchese, as President: An Order requesting the approval of an appropriation by borrowing in the amount of \$1,500,000 from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority Lead Loan Program.

Mayor's Chief of Staff Erin Deveney was also present.

Ms. Deveney informed the Committee that there were 8300 water service lines within the City and that 5000 of those were known to have lead/copper service. She explained that the MWRA began the program in 2016 and that the City of Everett has been proactive in replacing the old lead service without any cost to residents whereas in some other communities they are charging residents between \$5000-\$7000 to do so. She noted that in 2019 - 112 replaced, 2020 - 64replaced, 2021 - 58 replaced, 2022 - 107 replaced and this year the City is looking to replace 150. Councilor Smith remarked that at this pace it would take approximately 70 years and more than 83 million dollars to complete this task. Councilor Costa acknowledged that these are scary numbers and inquired to how the City was picking the 150? Ms. Deveney referenced a number of streets in North Everett where the work is expected to be done. Mr. Costa asked if the City was replacing these water services when the streets were open such as the ongoing street reconstruction work on Ferry and Elm Streets. Ms. Deveney agreed to confirm but mentioned that all utilities are usually updated when the streets are opened up. Ms. Deveney also agreed to provide a list of the lead replacement work that was completed. Councilors Costa and Smith both concurred that new Developers in the City should help the City shoulder the cost of this project. Councilor Costa reiterated his concern if the City was hitting its effectiveness when the roads were opened up and inquired if the City was looking into any infrastructure funding that may be available.

The Committee voted: to report back to the City Council with no recommendation pending the information the Mayor's Chief of Staff Erin Deveney agreed to provide.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor John Hanlon, presiding; Councilors Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith. Member absent was Councilor Vivian Nguyen.

Communication received from Councilor Nguyen that she would be away on vacation and unable to attend.

The Committee met on an Order offered by Councilor Michael Marchese, as President: An Order requesting the approval of an appropriation of \$307,552 from Receipts Reserved for Appropriations – Bond Premiums and \$178,448 from Receipts Reserved for Appropriation – Parking for a total of \$486,000 to fund the replacement of parking kiosks around the City.

Parking Officer Chad Luongo and Mark Berling of IPS Group were also present.

Councilor Smith asked if the City was planning replacing the parking meters or the parking kiosks and Mr. Luongo responded that the plan was to replace the existing kiosks which were originally installed in 2015. Mr. Luongo explained that the current kiosks were from a company in Canada and that it was difficult to get assistance in maintaining them with most of the work being done in house. He stated that the new company IPS Group has kiosks in neighboring communities and has four attendants working in Massachusetts. The Committee asked what the lifetime expectancy was for these kiosks and Mr. Berling responded that 8 to 10 years was a reliable time frame. Councilor Smith inquired if new signage would now be needed and Mr. Berling indicated that it may not since the kiosks will have scanning capabilities to show the operation. Councilor Costa referenced his knowledge of the meters and kiosks from working in the City of Somerville and discussed maintenance costs and fees for credit card transactions. Mr. Luongo confirmed that collections were around \$120,000 a year and Councilor Costa remarked that he hoped to see that go up noting that it may take 4 to 5 years to pay this cost off. He suggested that the City roll it out as a pilot program to allow feedback from residents while working out better merchant fees. Councilor Smith countered that the City needed the new kiosks now.

Now, therefore, by the authority granted to the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts to make ordinances:

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts that the Zoning Ordinances of the City of Everett be amended as follows:

Section 32 B (1) of the Zoning Ordinances is hereby amended by striking the words "ten (10) or more dwelling units" and replacing with "six (06) or more dwelling units". The revised subsection shall read as follows:

B. *Applicability*. In all zoning districts, the inclusionary zoning provisions of this Section shall apply to:

1. Any project or series of projects that results, in the aggregate, in a total of **six** (06) or more dwelling units, whether by new construction or by the alteration, expansion, reconstruction, or change of existing residential or nonresidential space. (C0187-18)

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage by the City Council and subsequent approval by His Honor the Mayor.

Legislative Affairs & Election Committee February 27, 2023

The Committee on Legislative Affairs & Elections met on Monday, February 27, 2023 at 6pm in the City Council Chambers.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor Michael Marchese, presiding, Councilors John Hanlon, Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith.

The Committee considered an Ordinance offered by Councilor Stephanie Martins: Amending Section B 1 of the Zoning Ordinances: Inclusionary Zoning.

Councilor Stephanie Martins, the Sponsor was also present.

Councilor Martins explained that she was looking to amend the existing Ordinance from ten or more dwelling units to six or more dwelling units in the hope that this slight tweak would be a huge impact on providing additional affordable housing. Councilor Smith remarked that she felt that this was a band aid approach especially with all the work the Committee has been doing on establishing an overall review and research of all zoning related matters within the City. She noted that this can't be done overnight and would take a lot more analysis with the Planning Department on board in doing a revamp. Councilor Martins assured the Committee that she had talked to the Planning Department about starting with six and stated that if it was delayed the City would be missing out on providing the additional affordable housing. Councilor Costa asked the Sponsor why six units and Councilor Martins explained that she had observed the conversion and market trends within the City. Councilor Martins asked how many current developers would be impacted and Councilor Martins noted that it would only take effect upon passage. Councilor Costa acknowledged that the Committee was working on the bigger problem of overall zoning in the City that needs solving and expressed concern that this could hurt proposed smaller developments and questioned the TDM point system. Councilor Costa remarked that he doesn't believe the change creates a significant solution to the affordable housing problem. Councilor Smith referenced what other communities were using for numbers and was not sure if the number six was the right number for the City of Everett. Councilor Costa stated that he had no faith in the 10 units and believed 6 units but was concerned on the timeframe in which the overall zoning review and revamp could be completed. Chairman Marchese recommended further time and requested that the Planning Department and Planning Board be invited to the next meeting on the subject matter and that they be provided a copy of Councilor Martins proposal.

The Committee voted, to grant further time on a date to be determined and requested that the Planning Department and Planning Board be invited to the next meeting on the subject matter and that they be provided a copy of Councilor Martins proposal.

The Committee on Legislative Affairs & Elections met on Monday, March 13, 2023 at 6pm in the City Council Chambers.

The meeting was recorded by ECTV and can be viewed on the City of Everett website.

Members present were Councilor Michael Marchese, presiding, Councilors John Hanlon, Darren Costa and Stephanie Smith.

The Committee considered an Ordinance offered by Councilor Stephanie Martins: Amending Section B 1 of the Zoning Ordinances: Inclusionary Zoning.

Director of Planning Matt Lattanzi and Councilor Stephanie Martins, the Sponsor were also present.

Councilor Martins explained that the only change to her proposal was lowering the number 10 dwelling units to 6 dwelling units in the Inclusionary zoning Ordinance in attempt to increase affordable housing units. Councilor Smith referenced the different number of units in other communities and expressed her concern on what would work right for the City of Everett taking into consideration that a Zoning recodification is about to take place. Mr. Lattanzi concurred that other communities were using number of dwellings from 6 to 15 but didn't feel that 6 was too low especially where some developers were lowering the number of units to be developed to 9 to avoid the current inclusionary zoning number of 10 dwelling units. Councilor Smith referenced potential costs to advertise the change noting the possibility it could be changed again when the zoning recodification is finalized. Mr. Lattanzi informed the Committee that he felt 6 was a good and reasonable number explaining that 6 units would require one affordable unit whereas 8 units would necessitate two affordable units. Councilor Smith asked if this is something that needed to be done now or should it wait until the zoning recodification is done. Mr. Lattanzi explained that the zoning revamp would take at least 8 to 12 months before a final product is submitted and indicated that some projects could slip through until that occurs. Councilor Costa expressed concern for multigenerational families living in a home being impacted by this proposal. He remarked that it appeared that members of the City Council were all running in their own lanes with regards to zoning initiatives. Councilor Costa asked if the proposed TDM changes would include projects of 6 units and Mr. Lattanzi responded that not all projects do. Councilor Costa asked Councilor Martins if she obtained feedback from Mass Housing on her proposal and Councilor Martins noted that she was addressing a need and would be contacting Mass Housing. She suggested that the Committee refer out with no recommendation. Chairman Marchese asked if a Developer was adding 2 units on an existing building of 12 units would it fall under this proposals and Mr. Lattanzi explained that all the units in the building would now fall under the 15% requirement. Chairman Marchese inquired that if the original ordinance had stated 6 units instead of 10 units how many additional affordable units would have been provided and Mr. Lattanzi indicated that 11 additional affordable units would have been added.

The Committee voted, to grant further time for one month.

Director of Planning Matt Lattanzi & Councilor Martins were also present

Director Lattanzi explained that the AMI was listed as state affordable, but not Everett affordable. Councilor Costa indicated that we should be at 10% AMI, but we are around between 8-8/1/2%, and Director Lattanzi concurred. Councilor Costa did indicate that he did not want to piece mail this. Councilor Martins was looking to continue revising this ordinance as needed. Director Lattanzi provided a list to Councilor Smith a breakdown of the projects missed, and that number was 11 total. Director Lattanzi indicated that a small revision needs to be done for 3A. Councilor Costa was added as a co-sponsor. Councilor Smith expressed her dissatisfaction and that only by changing he AMI would help make more apartments affordable. Councilor Hanlon concurred with Councilor Smith.

Motion was made by Councilor Smith, & seconded by Councilor Hanlon for favorable action

Councilors Marchese & Costa voted in the affirmative, & Councilors Hanlon & Smith voted in the negative

The Committee voted: to report back to the City Council with a recommendation that was unfavorable

Dear Honorable Members:

Please be advised that towing enforcement for street sweeping violations commenced on Monday, May 1, 2023.

The City uses a tiered enforcement effort to remind residents of the requirement to move parked vehicles during street sweeping season that starts each year on April 1st. These enforcement efforts included placing flyers translated into multiple languages on parked vehicles at the end of March. Parking Enforcement then issued written warnings (931 during the first week of warnings issued), and then 2 weeks of tickets (767 tickets issued in the first week of ticketing, which was only a 4-day week due to the Patriot's Day holiday) including fines for failing to remove vehicles as required.

Given the significant number of vehicles that were not parked properly despite efforts to remind residents, we have moved forward with the towing phase of the enforcement effort. On Monday, May 1st, there were 91 vehicles towed.

The Administration would like to take this opportunity to remind residents to pay attention to the signage posted across the City informing them of the street sweeping schedule. If residents find signs that are faded or need to be replaced, they are encouraged to please contact 311 and we will have the signage replaced.

AN ORDINANCE BANNING THE SALE OF NIPS IN THE CITY OF EVERETT

WHEREAS: the sale and consumption of "nips" (small, single-serving bottles of alcoholic beverages) within the City of Everett contributes to littering and public intoxication; and

WHEREAS: it is in the best interest of the public and the environment of the City of Everett to ban the sale of nips within city limits.

NOW, therefore, by the authority granted to the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts to make and amend ordinances:

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Everett, Massachusetts that Chapter 12 – Licenses And Business Regulations of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Everett is hereby amended by adding *Section 12-2007 – Sale of Nips Forbidden* as follows:

Section 12-2007. SALE OF NIPS FORBIDDEN

Section 12-2007.1. Definitions

- (a) The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
 - (1) "Nips" means any small, single-serving bottle of alcoholic beverages containing no more than 100 milliliters of liquid.
 - (2) "Retailer" means any person, partnership, or corporation that sells or offers for sale alcoholic beverages within the City of Everett.

Section 12-2007.2. Prohibition

- (a) No retailer shall sell or offer for sale nips within the City of Everett.
- (b) Any retailer found in violation of this section shall be subject to penalties as outlined in Section 12-2007.4.

Section 12-2007.3. Exceptions

This section shall not apply to:

- (a) Wholesalers, distributors, or manufacturers who sell nips to licensed retailers located outside the City of Everett.
- (b) Sale or distribution of nips for promotional purposes in compliance with state and local laws, provided they are not for individual retail sale.

Section 12-2007.4. Penalties


(a) Penalties for violations of this section shall be in accordance with the provisions of Section 1-8.


This ordinance shall take effect upon passage by the City Council and subsequent approval by His Honor the Mayor.
































Retailers say a sales ban on mini-booze bottles won't help Boston. But Chelsea leaders say their law was transformational.

What Boston city councilors learned Monday as the council considers a potential ban of their own.

Should nips be banned in Boston? Here's why readers are split.

A potential ban on the sale of mini bottles of alcohol in Boston could either be a disastrous blow to the city's package stores or a transformational approach to tackling alcoholism and litter.

That's at least what Boston city councilors heard during a hearing Monday, where testimony from a director of the Massachusetts Package Store Association and from Chelsea city leaders, who put in place a similar ban in 2018, offered dueling visions of what a ban on retail sales of alcohol bottles of 100 milliliters or less may bring about.

"A ban of this nature has proven to generate no measurable impacts on systemic littering or public intoxication, but they would directly harm and potentially ruin small and minority-owned businesses, and there's so many in the city of Boston," Steve Rubin, of the package store association and owner of Huntington Wine and Spirits in Fenway. "These businesses are highly stressed as is."

But former Chelsea City Councilor Roy Avellaneda and Chelsea Police Chief Keith Houghton said a ban in their city proved otherwise.

Alcohol-related emergency calls have dropped, data shows, while Chelsea's downtown has seen less panhandling and cleaner streets, and, as a result, has enjoyed an overall better atmosphere in recent years as restaurants and other businesses thrived, they said.

"I've noticed a transformation of the community," said Jason Owens, a community outreach worker in Chelsea, who works to connect individuals with substance use disorder and mental illness to appropriate services. "It's absolutely beautiful now."

The hearing, sponsored by Councilor Ricardo Arroyo, brought together the city's public health and licensing officials, along with leaders from Chelsea and Newton — communities with their own retail bans — to consider how this kind of law could have a positive impact on public health and litter.

There is no specific law currently proposed.

There are at least 70 stores that already do not sell the small bottles as set by a condition imposed by the Boston Licensing Board when granting a retail liquor license, Arroyo said.

He noted how litter alone from the mini bottles is widespread and cited how one local group in his district, Keep Hyde Park Beautiful, was able to collect 10,000 bottles in less than two months.

Being able to address two issues at once is "an overwhelming reason to move forward with something like this," Arroyo said.

The argument from retailers

Last month, Robert Mellion, executive director and general counsel for the Massachusetts Package Store Association, told Boston.com the ban would likely be more of "a political issue than it is a practical solution."

"If the purpose to banning, let's say 100 milliliters [and] down, is to prevent public drunkenness, then that's not going to do it. That's not going to address the issue," he said. "... That's just because, you know, a 200 milliliter or 250 milliliter bottle can be hidden just as well as a 100 milliliter bottle can [be] so all you're going to do is incentivize somebody ... to just buy several sizes up."

It's a point Rubin reiterated Monday.

He recalled how the city has before asked retailers to refrain from selling the bottles the day of the South Boston St. Patrick's Day parade — a move that has backfired.

"What happened was the worst thing for alcoholism," he said. "Everyone went up to the next size."

With a ban on 100 milliliter bottles, the next available size for customers will be 200 milliliters.

"That's a container that you can't drink in public," Rubin said. "So what's going to happen to that container of 200 [milliliters]? It's going to be a big problem. So that's going to increase alcoholism for most."

Rubin said the solution lies in public-private partnerships between retailers and municipalities.

He offered, for example, that officials should seek to expand the state's "bottle bill" — the law that provides for a 5-cent recycling deposit on select bottles and cans — to include the small bottles. The package store association has supported legislation to do so on Beacon Hill for the past three legislative sessions.

He also said the industry often sponsors anti-littering campaigns and initiatives and wondered aloud where the government-funded anti-littering campaigns are to help with the issue.

Meanwhile, a ban, Rubin said, would put Boston package stores at a disadvantage to neighboring cities and towns, where retailers would still be able to sell the miniature bottles.

Rubin, citing data from suppliers, said sales increased 63.9% in East Boston, 25.8% in Revere, and 13.8% in Everett after the Chelsea ban took hold.

"Revenues at stores plummeted," he said. "No, they didn't go out of business. But ask them how bad their sales have been."

What happened in Chelsea

Avellaneda, the former Chelsea city councilor, said since the city rolled out its ban on mini bottles of alcohol in 2018, there was a large drop in the number of alcohol-related emergency calls.

Before the law in 2015, Chelsea logged 720 calls; 521 calls in 2016; 400 calls in 2018; and 216 calls in 2020, he said.

"That's an incredible amount of resources no longer used by public safety officials because we simply banned [the bottles]," Avellaneda said.

The city also got cleaner — something he described as an "immediate overnight success."

Chelsea's downtown in particular "transformed," he said. He credited the law, along with wraparound services and supports for those struggling with alcoholism, with helping to reduce panhandling in the area.

"Once the ban went into place downtown Broadway is now revitalized," Avellaneda said.

Families and residents have been attracted to the neighborhood in a way they weren't in the years before the ban, he said.

"The restaurant scene is booming," he added. "We've had an increase in meal taxes. We've had increases in jobs and we have less vacancy in our storefronts downtown."

According to Avellaneda, no package stores closed after the ban took effect.

Last year, a liquor license for retail sold for five times the value of what it was before the COVID-19 pandemic, he said.

"Obviously there is still money to be made," he said.

According to Houghton, the police chief, Chelsea continues to see 20% fewer instances where authorities must place an intoxicated person into protective custody than in 2018.

"Chelsea is rejuvenated," he said.

Arroyo wants to ban sale of 'nips' in Boston

City councilor calls small liquor bottles a public health hazard and litter blight



Fed up with thousands of tiny booze bottles littering his district, and concerned about the public health impact of a product that seems tailor-made to feed alcohol addiction, Boston City Councilor Ricardo Arroyo is calling for a hearing to consider a ban on the sale of "nips" in retail liquor stores in the city.



Sale of the small 50- and 100-milliliter containers of hard liquor has long been a source of neighborhood ire in urban communities, where they are often the bottle of choice for homeless people and those drinking on street corners and in public parks. Since 2018, five Massachusetts communities have banned nip sales. But a no-nip proposal in the state's largest city will reverberate loudly, elevating the stakes of the debate and attention it is likely to generate.

Arroyo said there is a "two-pronged" argument for a ban, citing evidence that it has been "directly related to better health outcomes" in Chelsea, the first Massachusetts community to impose a ban, and has had a "an almost immediate" impact on litter in the densely-packed city of 40,000 residents just north of Boston.

"I haven't heard any good reason not to do this," Arroyo said, other than "profit margins for liquor stores" that rely on nip sales.

Along with Chelsea, nip bans have been adopted in Falmouth, Mashpee, Newton, and Wareham.

In Chelsea, which adopted a ban on retail sale of nips in 2018, the move has been "a game-changer," said Keith Houghton, the city's police chief.

Following adoption of the ban, calls for ambulance and firefighter response to alcohol-related medical emergencies in Chelsea fell by more than half. Houghton said the city has long had a serious issue with homeless alcoholics congregating in public places. The nip ban has not solved it, but the problem has been "seriously reduced," said Houghton, who was a police captain when the ban was crafted and served as the department's liaison to the city licensing commission.

"It's hard to not notice the difference on the streets," said Roy Avellenada, a former Chelsea city councilor who helped lead the push for the ban. Avellenada and Houghton said nips that were once regularly strewn throughout downtown Chelsea and in many parks have all but disappeared.

"The parks are clean" and people are "not loitering on benches" downtown, said Hougthton.

Chelsea initially banned the sale of 50-milliliter liquor bottles, but then expanded the new rule to include 100-milliliter containers.

Robert Mellion, executive director of the Massachusetts Package Stores Association, said the bans do little to tackle alcohol addiction issues, as people simply find ways to buy pints and larger containers. As for the litter problem, Mellion's organization favors legislation that has been filed for several years to expand the state's bottle bill to include nips.

"That's the practical solution," said Mellion.

Just how big a problem are discarded nips? In one area of Arroyo's Hyde Parkbased district, volunteers with a local neighborhood beautification organization picked up more than 10,000 of the miniature liquor bottles in a period of less than two months.

Including nips in the state's bottle bill would bring a new – and costly – challenge to recycling efforts, as the existing machines used to recycle plastic containers can't process the tiny bottles.

Mellion said the Chelsea ban hasn't necessarily led to less alcohol abuse, it's only shifted the location where it occurs. He said wholesale liquor sale data show that a decrease in overall sales in Chelsea has been accompanied by increases in neighboring East Boston and Everett.

No Chelsea liquor stores have closed as a result of the ban. But Mellion said the city licensing rule has been hard on Chelsea liquor outlets, with nip sales accounting for as much as 20 percent of all sales at some of them. "A lot of stores rely on those sales," he said.

Arroyo plans to introduce an order at this week's council meeting calling for a hearing at which he wants to hear from officials from the Boston Public Health Commission and the Licensing Board that oversees liquor sales on the potential benefits of a nip ban.

A spokesman for Mayor Michelle Wu was non-committal, saying "we are reviewing the language in the hearing order and look forward to the hearing."

Arroyo said neighborhood residents already push the Licensing Board to ban nip sales as a condition of license transfers or when a store seeks approval to expand.

That kind of piecemeal approach "is like whack-a-mole," said Avellenada, the former Chelsea city councilor. "You're not solving the issue, you're shifting where they can go buy them."

Mellion said the liquor store owners association will oppose any effort to stop all nip sales in Boston. "A ban in Boston is definitely going to have impacts all across the state," he said.

Avellenada thinks the industry will mount an all-out effort to block a nip ban in the state's capital city.

"Boston is the 800-pound gorilla," he said. "As Boston goes, maybe the rest of Massachusetts will go."
