- Approximately 10 feet of 6-inch gas main crossing Second Street.

Diana Cuddy from National Grid explained they are requesting permission to extend gas mains on Boston Street down to Second and Third Street to service a development project, based on a customer request. The mains will be high pressure 60-pound gas mains. Councilor Pietrantonio asked if laterals were included, and Cuddy clarified the grant of location was just for the mains, with services coming off the main on private property. Councilor Hanlon expressed confusion about the locations and asked if all the work would happen simultaneously. Cuddy said the permitting would determine if it was plated at night or had temporary trench restoration. Hanlon asked what the gas would service on Second Street, but Cuddy did not have that information. Councilor Marchese asked if existing lines were being replaced. Cuddy said there was a low pressure line and the high pressure line stopping before Third Street that would be extended. Councilor Garcia asked if the work would be done during the day or night. Cuddy said it depended on the city's permitting. The public

hearing was opened. No one spoke in favor or against. The hearing was closed. Councilor Hanlon made a motion to refer to committee to get more details from the gas company and the business being serviced, which passed.

An order requesting approval to accept and expend a grant to the Planning Department from the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs in the amount of \$687,500 which will be used to implement resident-led outdoor cooling solutions in environmental justice neighborhoods

Matt Lattanzi, director of planning and development, explained this grant is phase 2 of the Wicked Mystic Cooling program. It will engage residents of all ages in 4 municipalities (Everett, Chelsea, Malden, Arlington) to identify locations and design cooling bus shelters. Construction is included but may not cover 100% of costs. The total project is \$776,200 with a \$687,000 grant and \$89,200 of in-kind staff time from the 4 cities. Councilor Martins asked if there was already a plan. Lattanzi said phase 1 was complete but phase 2 was starting with engagement to locate the shelters and discuss if that's the best use of funds. Councilor Smith asked if more grants would cover construction. Lattanzi said some construction was included but he'd have to check if it was 100%. Councilor Pietrantonio asked about maintenance. Lattanzi assumed MBTA but wasn't certain. Councilor Hanlon requested periodic updates on spending and project end date.

The amount in the order needed to be amended to \$771,900. Councilor Pietrantonio

Councilor Smith explained \$650,000 was from the Parlin School exterior wall project that ended up not needing to be done, and \$121,900 was left over from the Whittier School gym project that came in under budget. Clerk Cornelio clarified the city had already borrowed the money through bonds, so repurposing it required city council approval to avoid borrowing again for a new project. An ordinance requiring all playing fields in Everett to use environmentally sustainable organic grass instead of artificial turf

The ordinance was amended in the Legislative Affairs committee to allow exceptions for turf when voted on by city council, as demonstrated by the stadium turf vote earlier in the meeting. Councilor Rogers explained the ordinance removes the default assumption that fields will be turf, requiring a vote and discussion on a case-by-case basis with input from the parks department. Turf can still be approved if sensible and environmentally sustainable. Favorable action as amended. Motion was made to reconsider the item which then failed to be brought back and the vote for Favorable action stands.

Councilor DiPierro shared an email from the chief of staff. ISD created a pamphlet on preventing rodent problems that residents can report to 311. The city contracts with a pest control company to do residential baiting. Code enforcement investigates problem areas and works with residents on overgrown vegetation. Large permitted construction projects must have an active rodent mitigation plan. Data on 311 calls for 2023-2024 was provided. Councilor DiPierro questioned if the mitigation requirement

for construction was being enforced. Councilor Smith said the administration committed to working on putting more responsibility on contractors for rodent issues near construction, to avoid city cost. Councilor Garcia relayed a resident's concern that the city's baiting service was not effective compared to a private company.

That EPD Chief Strong update the City Council on how his first couple of months have gone as Chief of Police and If he has implemented any new policies under his direction.

Chief Strong provided an update on his first few months as police chief. The department is pursuing state certification, which involves updating policies and procedures and making building improvements. This is expected in 8-10 months. He outlined progress and plans in various units:

- Patrol seized 7 firearms in 3 months, is getting new hybrid vehicles, and conducted over 500 directed patrols in parks.
- The drug unit had multiple undercover cases, some using SWAT for high-risk warrants.
- 5 officers were added to the SWAT team, with free training from Boston Police.
- Detectives are getting technology training on cell phone data extraction.
- A sergeant was added to the School Resource Officers for 5 total, building relationships with the school department.
- Dispatch is upgrading systems, including ability to receive emergency calls from ride-shares and an app for residents to report issues.

Councilors thanked him for the improved communication and social media presence. Councilor Smith asked about future promotions, which Chief Strong said are coming based on a management plan. Councilors Pietrantonio and Martins encouraged him to continue improving station conditions.

That Inspectional Services inspect Dempsey's Restaurant in Everett Square, as it is unsightly and unsafe.

Councilor Matewsky expressed frustration that Dempsey's Restaurant in Everett Square has not improved its appearance despite requests over several years. Issues include peeling paint, an unsafe walkway, locked customer entrance, and a dirty ceiling inside. He argued it looks out of place near recent renovations and as the city considers a \$3 million Everett Square project. Residents have complained but no action has been taken after a code enforcement visit a month and a half ago. Councilor Rogers said she received communication in July that interior and exterior renovations would happen within 3 months, by October 18th, but no progress had been made. Councilor Garcia was added as a co-sponsor and the item was referred to the mayor and code enforcement director for action.

That the post office explain why the mail is being delivered late, or not delivered at all.

Councilor Matewsky reported issues with lost, stolen and undelivered mail in Everett and surrounding communities. Residents have had late fees and credit score reductions from bills mailed but never received. Even without much mail, going 3-4 days without any delivery indicates a problem. An Everett mailman described people fishing mail out of boxes or stealing the blue boxes entirely to wash checks and steal identities. Surrounding communities like Revere are also impacted. Councilor Matewsky requested notifying the Boston postmaster general of dissatisfaction with mail delivery and services. Clerk Cornelio said he would deliver the message in person at an upcoming October 2nd meeting with the postmaster general and secretary of state. Councilor Matewsky suggested having a communications process where councilors are notified that department heads are receiving and responding to their requests.


